

The Clerk of the Council is also responsible for keeping the transcripts of the proceedings of the City Council.

The City Clerk has charge of all papers and documents of the City that include executive and administrative orders of the Manager, certificates of judicial appointments by the Mayor, Oaths of Office of City employees, and referendum petitions.

#### **EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT**



Derek K. Allen City Manager

City Manager Derek Allen, is the chief executive and administrative officer to the City of Portsmouth, Ohio. He supervises the affairs of all City Departments by holding Monday morning staff meetings with the individual department heads. In addition, he exercises direct control over purchasing as the City's Purchasing Agent as prescribed by the City Charter and is responsible for making fair, efficient and economical purchases of large and expensive items that some of our departments require to keep our city safe and is responsible for the canvassing of sealed and competitive bids and the awarding of contracts for services.

He oversees that Ordinances of the City of Portsmouth and the laws of the State of Ohio are enforced. He makes recommendations to City Council concerning affairs of the City and keeps Council advised of the financial condition and future needs of the City. He prepares and submits budgets to City Council and attends all City Council meetings and prepares bi-weekly reports for City Council.

Manager Allen was appointed for an indefinite term in 2013 and took office on January 6, 2014.

#### CITY AUDITOR



M. Trent Williams – City Auditor

The City of Portsmouth elects a City Auditor to serve four-year terms as its Chief Fiscal Officer. The Auditor is the director of the Department of Finance and Audits and also performs the duties of the City Treasurer, having charge of the administration of the financial affairs of the City, including keeping and supervising of all accounts, revenue recording, expenditure tracking, financial reporting and control and the custody and disbursements of City funds. The Auditor's office also has the responsibility of paymaster for nearly 300 employees.

The Department of Finance prepares monthly and annual financial statements and reports for submission to City Council and other City, county, state and federal offices and agencies. The Auditor performs audits and investigations of the accounts of City offices, makes investments and administers debt financing and other such duties as may be required by law. The Auditor attends all meetings of Council, making recommendations as necessary to ensure adherence to sound fiscal policy and compliance with federal, state and local regulations.

Each year, after the books are closed in December, the Finance Division begins the preparation of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The annual report, typically in publication by July for the previous fiscal year, is prepared in a business-like format, and is available for review by interested citizens upon request.

Under the direction of the City Auditor, the Income Tax Division administers and collects the City income tax revenues. For the convenience of its taxpayers and tax preparers, the City Tax Division has made its tax return forms and instructions available online in an easily downloadable format as well as links to local, state, and federal tax forms, regulations, and financial reports for use by both residents and businesses on the City's website.

The Clerk of Court's office is responsible for maintaining the public record on all court cases filed in Portsmouth's Municipal Court as well as collecting and distributing fines and fees associated with these cases. The Clerk of Portsmouth Municipal Court also has the power to administer oaths, take affidavits, including those for unpaid costs, process subpoenas, and approve all bonds.

#### **COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**



Tracy Shearer Community Development Director

Ms. Shearer has been with the City for 4 years. She started working in the Mayor's office, but an opportunity to become the Community Development Director presented itself and she has filled that position for the past 2 years. The mission of Community Development is to assist other City Departments with project funding. It is a work in progress as the city struggles with financial issues, but the department tries to assist with helping the community grow stronger, healthier and more viable. This Department realizes that the partnerships that are formed can affect real change in communities – making our community a better place to live, work and raise our families.

Community Development is currently administering Community Housing Improvement Program, Community Development Block Grants, Moving Ohio Forward, Appalachian Regional Commission and Ohio Public Works Commission grants which help to improve the housing stock and infrastructure within the City of Portsmouth.

Recent projects include demolitions of condemned houses, a new water filtration tank, storm water retention basin, engineering studies, and new concrete and electrical upgrades for the riverfront. Grant funding for infrastructure is critical in assisting the City Government with the costs associated with these projects.

#### ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT



# **Crystal Weghorst Director of Engineering**

The Engineering Department, under Director of Engineering Crystal Weghorst, is composed of three major divisions; Administration, Building Maintenance and Building Inspection. The Department plans for the development of various improvements and is responsible for the welfare, safety and enjoyment of Portsmouth citizens. She manages the City's engineering budget and the development of goals and objectives for the city. She supervises bids for construction jobs on city projects and assists the City Manager in selecting the right contractor. In addition to the management functions, it is also her responsibility to report projects in need of refurbishment or additions which may include city buildings, facades, streets and sidewalks and to advise the City Manager when there are potential violations. The department also determines if there are any building or infrastructure issues that may require repair. It is also the department's responsibility to be familiar with all city codes and regulations, recommending ordinance changes and interacting with County and State Governments on various issues that relate to the City. In addition to the design of improvements, the City Engineer's Office enforces building codes and oversees work done for the City by private contractors.

In 2014, the Department prepared plans and specifications for the following projects: Repair to Oakland Boulevard, Blue Rock Drive and resurfacing streets.

The Director of Engineering is indeed a busy person and in addition serves as a voting member of the City Planning Commission and Traffic Committee.

Fire Chief William Raison

Providing fire protection for a City as large as Portsmouth is a great responsibility and once again last year Chief Raison and his department did the job. The Portsmouth Fire Department as we know it today was first established as 1871. They fought their first fire on March the 7<sup>th</sup> at the Biggs House on the corner of Market and Front Street. Since that time, the department has undergone many changes ranging from horse drawn steamers to the modern fire engine. At its peak, the department operated four stations with 56 full time firefighters providing fire and rescue services to our community.

Currently, the department operates 3 stations and the 911 communications center, they are as follows: Central Station, Hilltop Station and Sciotoville Station. When fully staffed, this is accomplished with a force of 38 full time uniformed firefighters, 7 civilian dispatchers and 1 administrative assistant. Staffing for 2014 was 36 firefighters, 6 civilian dispatchers and 1 administrative assistant Karen Galloway.

Our primary response area is the City of Portsmouth, Ohio (Population 2010 Census 20,226) covering approximately 11 square miles. In addition to this population, Shawnee State University is located in the heart of the city and has approximately 4400 students on a campus covering 62 acres with 28 buildings. Approximately 25% of these students live on campus, and a significant number of them live near campus. Our department also provides automatic aid to the Village of New

Boston (population 2,272) and portions of Porter Township (population 9,892). The department is a member of the Ohio Valley Firefighters' Association and has formal mutual aid agreements with all departments in Scioto County (population 79,499) as well as some departments in neighboring Adams, Pike, Lawrence and Jackson Counties in Ohio and Greenup County, Kentucky. Additionally, the department is a member of a regional Urban Search and Rescue Response Team serving Ohio Homeland Security Region 7 encompassing 11 counties.

In addition to the citizens of Portsmouth, the department is responsible for the protection of critical infrastructure located in our region. Most notably is the Norfolk and Southern Rail Yard situated directly in the center of our city. Here hazardous material laden cars and tanks sit awaiting transfer. In fact, according to the Ohio Statewide Rail Plan Final Report, over 300 million tons of cargo travels across rail line in the state. The Portsmouth lines (excess of 12 miles) are a major component of that system with nearly  $1/3^{\rm rd}$  of that tonnage passing through our jurisdiction. Furthermore, Ohio's rail network also includes key connections with maritime facilities on the Ohio River. We are located directly on and respond to events on the Ohio River. Consequently, transportation services have the potential for our most in-depth response needs to a given emergent situation.

Other infrastructure that we protect in whole or in part include:

- Southern Ohio Medical Center Primary health care provider in Southern Ohio; one of the area's largest employers.
- Portsmouth Municipal Water Department and Portsmouth Municipal Waste Treatment these municipal facilities provide drinking water and environmental waste treatment
  services for the entire City of Portsmouth; Southern Ohio Medical Center, OSCO Industries,
  Southern Ohio Correctional Facility, Sun Coke Corp, Shawnee State University and many
  other local employers as well as some unincorporated areas of the county.
- American Electric Power major distribution substations that direct power to our city and beyond.
- United States Enrichment Corporation A uranium enrichment/nuclear gaseous diffusion plant located in Piketon, we would respond under mutual aid agreements.
- Time Warner Cable Systems provides telecommunications and internet information access to a large part of the region, including hub connections between regional medical care facilities for the distribution of medical information.
- Corps of Engineers floodwall for the Ohio River our firefighters are part of the primary response group to assemble and sandbag floodwall gates critical to flood protection for our city.

The department also provides technical rescue operations which include: Water Rescue, Dive Operations, Structural Collapse, Rope Rescue, Trench Rescue and Auto Extrication.

2014 marked a significant change in The Portsmouth Fire Department as they hired the first female firefighter Ashley Schwamberger.

Mr. Smith has been with the Portsmouth City Health Department for 20 years. He started in 1995 as a Sanitarian, inspecting restaurants, schools, pools, campgrounds, marinas, and many other programs. After 9-11, he moved to the position of Emergency Response Coordinator, including working as a FEMA Disaster Employee responding to multiple hurricanes down south. In 2007, Smith completed his Master's in Homeland Security from the Naval Post Graduate School and took the position of Director of Environmental Health. With the retirement of Peggy Burton, in 2011, Smith took over as Health Commissioner for the city, and last year joined the Army Reserves, where as a Captain he serves as the Environmental Science Officer for the 330<sup>th</sup> medical Brigade in Chicago.

The Portsmouth City Health Department is comprised of 30 employees in four divisions (Environmental, Air, Nursing and Care/Prevention). Since becoming Health Commissioner, Smith has worked with his staff and City Government to institute the Rental Licensing Program, the Land Reutilization Program, and the Employee Based Health Care Clinic. He has also been active with the community in launching the Scioto County Health Coalition.

The Portsmouth City Health Department is dedicated to protecting and improving the health of the citizens of Portsmouth, through inspection programs, code enforcement, health education, disease surveillance, and numerous clinical services.



This includes but is not limited to food service and retail food establishment inspections, rental dwelling inspections, swimming pool inspections, school inspections, other state mandated inspections, animal control, solid waste/housing/nuisance complaint abatement, ambulance inspections, emergency preparedness, the issuance of birth and death certificates and burial permits.

#### **Food Service**

## **AIR DIVISION**



**Cindy Charles, Air Division Director** 

Ms. Charles has resided in the Portsmouth area for over 25 years. She is a graduate of Shawnee State University with a Bachelor of Natural Science degree and has been the Director of the Air Division since 2007. She has been with the Air Division for a total of 19 years where she has also worked as a Permit Specialist and Permit Supervisor. Her past work experience includes 2 ½ years as an Environmental Specialist at Dayton Power & Light Company in Manchester, OH.

She is responsible for managing the air permitting, compliance monitoring, enforcement, ambient air monitoring, asbestos, complaint investigations, and Permission to Open Burn activities for the Air Division. This department oversees a combined operational budget in excess of 557 thousand dollars and employs 5 full-time personnel that are managed by the Air Division Director.

#### Introduction

The Air Division or the Portsmouth Local Air Agency (PLAA) works as a contractual representative of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). The PLAA monitors the compliance status of the businesses and industries with air pollution sources in the four-county region (Adams, Scioto, Lawrence, and Brown). Additionally, the PLAA prepares permits, conducts facility inspections and reviews quarterly deviation and excess emission reports, observe source stack tests, review and issue or deny permission to open burn, monitor asbestos removal activities, initiates enforcement actions and responds to air quality complaints.

The PLAA also maintains continuous and intermittent monitors measuring pollutants on a daily basis throughout its four-county area in Southern Ohio. The PLAA performs anti-tampering (vehicle emission control devices) inspections and observes and validates stack (source) testing that occurs in the four-county area.

#### **Primary Care Clinic**

The City Health Department Clinic provides primary care medical services to patients who do not have another primary care provider. In 2013 two hundred and twenty-three (223) primary care visits were scheduled.

#### Reproductive Health and Wellness (Family Planning) Clinic:

The Reproductive Health and Wellness Clinic program provides care and services to women and men who are able to reproduce, and have any of the following health care needs:

- General women's health screening and care
- Cancer screening
- Pap Smears
- Pregnancy screening, initial prenatal care, and referral
- Contraceptive counseling, education, and care
- Screening, education on prevention, and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases
- Laboratory testing
- Vaccines
- Education on breast self-exam and testicular self-exam
- Nutritional counseling and education
- Partner violence screening and support

This program focuses on assisting patients in developing a reproductive life plan. Through education and provision of contraceptives that meet their personal needs, the program allows patients to have children when they are ready, healthy, and free of disease. In addition to the medical care provided to our patients, there is a strong emphasis on education related to prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, on benefits and risks of various type of birth control, and on screening and preventative care to optimize the general health.

The clinic is open Monday through Friday from 8:00AM to 4:30PM. The clinic offers evening hours, until 7:00PM on the fourth Tuesday for patients who cannot come during day time hours. Patients are seen by the Family Nurse Practitioner and our clinic nurses.

The Portsmouth City Health Department receives funding for the Reproductive Health and Wellness Clinic from the Ohio Department of Health. There is a strong emphasis on providing care to low income and indigent patients. No patient is turned away due to their inability to pay for services.

In 2013 the Family Planning Clinic scheduled fourteen hundred and sixty-three (1463) patient visits. This is down from seventeen hundred and eighty-five (1785) visits in 2012.

#### **Ryan White HIV Positive Primary Care Clinic:**

In 2005 the Portsmouth City Health Department was awarded a grant for the Ryan White HIV Program from Ross County General Health District. Since that time the Portsmouth City Health Department has continued to receive funding for this program. The program provides medical case management for persons infected with HIV/AIDS. In order to qualify for the program, a patient must have a positive western blot and be enrolled in the Ryan White Part C Medical Care Management program. Services are provided to patients who qualify for the program in the tri-state area. Care providers are located in Huntington West Virginia, Ashland Kentucky, Athens, Ohio, Piketon Ohio and Portsmouth, Ohio. Linda Nichols is the Medical Case Manager for this program. She is a licensed Registered Nurse in Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia.

Local patients who are enrolled in this program are seen regularly in the Portsmouth Health Department Clinic. These patients are routinely seen by David Byers, MD, who specializes in infectious disease treatment, Nadia Chammas, MD, and Tiffany Wolfe, Family Nurse Practitioner.

In 2013 the Portsmouth City Health Department provided medical case management services to one hundred and thirty-eight (138) patients throughout the region. Ryan White patients in the Portsmouth region were seen for eighty-one (81) visits in 2013.

#### **Opiate Addiction Treatment Clinic:**

In February 2012 the Portsmouth City Health Department Clinic began treating people who were addicted to Opiates and Alcohol. This program has continued in 2013. Patients with these addictions are treated with Vivitrol injections once every twenty-eight days.

These patients receive chemical dependency counseling from Dr. Randy Schlegel, and medical care from Tiffany Wolfe, our Family Nurse Practitioner.

Vivitrol injections are paid for by Medicaid and private insurance. Patients who do not have a current payer source can receive injections at no cost from resources provided by Alkermes pharmaceuticals until another funding source can be arranged.

In 2013 one hundred and sixty-five (165) new patients were enrolled in the Opiate Addiction Treatment Clinic. This is up from eighty-six (86) new patients in 2012. A total of three hundred and thirty five (335) Vivitrol injections were given in 2013.

#### Child Safety "Baby Buckles" Program

The Ohio "Baby Buckles" Program is a child safety program administered by the Portsmouth City Health Department which provides free car seats to parents who cannot afford to purchase one for their child. Funding for this program is provided through the Ohio Department of Public Safety. Priscilla Pennington, LPN/Clinic Nurse acts as the Region 9 Coordinator in Ohio. She oversees nine distribution centers for this regional program. Distribution centers for Region 9 are located in Scioto, Lawrence, Vinton, Athens, Jackson, Meigs, Pike, Gallia and Washington County. As the regional coordinator, Priscilla is responsible for training all Program Technicians, and for monitoring each regional site to assure that the program is being carried out according to Department of Public Safety regulations. Priscilla and Lisa Roberts, RN are certified instructors for this program. They provide initial certification and annual re-certification classes on car seat education and proper installation to Program Technicians in each region.

Each distribution center in the region receives sixty car seats annually (fifteen per quarter) for free distribution. Car seats are distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis. If a car seat is not available at the time a parent applies, they are placed on a waiting list and given first priority when a new shipment arrives.

In order to receive a free car seat, parents must view an instructional video on car seat safety and proper installation. Once training is completed, the certified instructor observes the parent install the car seat according to the program safety installation guidelines. Reports on car seat education distribution are submitted to the Ohio Department of Public Safety each quarter.

In 2013 five hundred and forty-eight (548) car seats were distributed in Region 9. The Portsmouth City Health Department distributed sixty-eight (68) car seats in 2013.

The Health Department Clinic staff provides education about the Car Seat Safety Program to the local community through attendance and distribution of informational brochures at community.

#### **Communicable Disease Control**

Christine Thomas, RN is the Public Health Nurse for the Portsmouth City Health Department. In this role, she is responsible for investigation and follow up on all reportable infectious diseases contracted by Portsmouth city residents. Christine receives notifications of communicable disease from local health care providers, and from the state of Ohio Disease Reporting System (ODRS). She is responsible for follow-up and reporting on all communicable disease cases that occur in the city. As the Public Health Nurse she is responsible for monitoring all communicable disease cases in her jurisdiction to assure that they are receiving appropriate medical care.

The top five reportable Communicable Diseases in the city of Portsmouth during 2013 were:

- Hepatitis C 127 cases reported. This virus infects the liver and creates a chronic, incurable illness.
- Chlamydia 109 cases reported. Chlamydia is a sexually transmitted disease (STD).
- Gonorrhea 21 cases reported. Gonorrhea is a sexually transmitted disease (STD).
- Myobacterial 15 cases reported. Myobacterial Non-TB is a chronic bacterial.

- Non-TB infection of the lung, which requires long-term, aggressive antibiotic therapy.
- Influenza 14 cases reported. Associated with Hospitalization. (See the comprehensive 2013 Communicable Disease Cases report).

#### **Bureau for Children with Medical Handicaps (BCMH) Program**

The Portsmouth City Health department provides services to handicapped children through the Bureau for Children with Medical Handicaps (BCMH) Program. Belinda Salisbury, RN acts as the Case Manager for this program. In her role as Case Manager, she coordinates diagnostic and treatment services for children with identified special health care needs. In 2013 the BCMH program provided services for 43 children.

#### **DNA Testing**

The Portsmouth City Health Department Clinic maintains a contract with the Ohio Department of Job and Family Service in Scioto County to obtain DNA specimens to determine parentage. People who have received a court order to have testing done come to the Health Department Clinic. Our nurses collect the DNA specimens and send these to Lab Corp., Inc. for DNA analysis. In 2013 the Health Department Clinic collected 374 DNA specimens.

#### **Immunizations**

The City Health Department Clinic provides immunization vaccines to children. Ohio Department of Health Guidelines are followed for childhood immunization. The Health Department Clinic is part of the Ohio Department of Health's "Vaccines for Children" project. This project provides free vaccines to our agency, to immunize children from birth to age nineteen.

In addition to childhood vaccines, the Clinic also provides vaccines for other populations. In 2013 the Health Department Clinic gave twenty-five hundred and twenty-three vaccines (2523). The following is a breakdown of vaccines given:

## DIVISION OF PREVENTION



Jone Payton, Director of the Division of Prevention

Ms. Payton is a lifelong resident of Portsmouth and the Scioto County area. She has been the Assistant Director of the City of Portsmouth Public Service Department from 1974 to 1984 and has been at the Portsmouth City Health Department (PCHD) since 1996 in the HIV/STD Division.

During her time at the PCHD her duties have been managing all of the fiscal components and reporting for the HIV and STD Prevention grants thru the Ohio Department of Health from 1996 to 2005, as well as technical assistant to The Rural AIDS Advisory Group (TRAAG) and providing assistance to the Rural AIDS Coordinator. With the addition of the Ryan White grant in 2005 Ms. Payton assumed the fiscal reporting and managing to the Human Resources and Services Administration (HRSA). In 2008 and to the present, Ms. Payton assumed the Rural AIDS Coordinator position as well as Community Grants Coordinator, being responsible for facilitation of more than one million in grant funds, overseeing the operations of the grants.

#### Introduction

The Division of Prevention & Care (DPC) has a staff of eight personnel with a combined total of approximately 96 years' experience working in public health. The DPC provides HIV/STD prevention services to a 58 county rural region; partner notification services for HIV and Syphilis to a 58 county rural region; care and treatment for HIV+ clients in 24 counties in a three state region; RN/Medical Case Management services for HIV+; addresses adult fatal prescription drug overdose; piloted Project Dawn, to address adult fatal prescription drug overdose through the use of nasal naloxone in a community setting; and addressing youth substance use.

#### **HIV/STD Prevention**

The Portsmouth City Health Department in 2013 through a cooperative grant with the Ohio Department of Health, provided free confidential and anonymous HIV Prevention; Testing; and Counseling services to 58 of Ohio's rural designated counties. This grant funded four health departments in the rural counties of Ohio to provide these HIV Prevention services, as well as Diffusion of Effective Behavioral Interventions (DEBI's) to targeted at risk populations in their respective county and their surrounding three or more counties. This grant also provides HIV Prevention services for 34 local health departments, colleges, universities, and CBO's.

## The Rural AIDS Advisory Group (TRAAG) WWW.TRAAG.ORG

The Rural AIDS/Community Grants Coordinator facilitated the community planning group process in 2013 with assistance from the Special Projects Officer through The Rural AIDS Advisory Group (TRAAG), where community members met quarterly. These quarterly community planning group meetings provided an opportunity for the infected and affected rural population to take a vested interest in how the grant monies are best utilized, as well as provide an excellent networking resource. The meetings are consensus driven and rarely go to a vote by the membership. The meetings were held at the Tall Timbers Banquet and Conference Center, in Fairfield County and provided capacity building and educational programming to those in attendance; information and statistics on the epidemic; statistics and programming being performed in each of the 58 rural region 8 counties; as well as participating in the processes required by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) HIV Prevention Community Planning.

#### **Rural AIDS Coordinator**

The Rural AIDS/Community Grants Coordinator (RA/CGC) performed site visits on funded and non-funded agencies in 2013, as well as attended one conference out of state and conferences and meetings in state. Evaluation Material Review Panel (EMRP) Ohio Department of Health (ODH) grant required meetings were held at the State Library in Columbus. The Rural Special Projects Officer and the Rural AIDS Coordinator shared the four grant required meeting attendance in 2013. The RA/CGC also served as the co-chair facilitator of the Ohio Community Planning Group (OCPG) and attended the required meetings also held at the State Library in Columbus. The RA/CGC also attends, along with the DIS Field Supervisor, STD Prevention grant required meetings twice per year.

#### **Rural HIV Prevention Grant**

The Rural HIV Prevention Grant Award for 2013 was \$669,480 of which 84% was federally funded and 16% state funded and the STD Prevention grant for 2013 was \$168,244 which is 100% federally funded. The grant funds were awarded and expended as follows:

2013 HIV/STD Prevention: \$837,724 Contracted Funded Agencies: \$450,040

In 2013, the rural areas provided 8,428 Counseling, Testing, Referral (CTR) sessions. In addition, the four funded contracted agencies projected an overall goal to provide the CDC mandated Diffusion of Effective Behavioral Interventions (DEBI's) to 5,393 clients in targeted populations. The DEBI programs the four funded contracted agencies provided in 2013 were Healthy Relationships; Heath Education/Risk Reduction; Respect; Voices/Voces.

For 2013, the Portsmouth City Health Department (PCHD) was provided funding for four Disease Intervention Specialists (DIS), through the HIV Prevention and STD Control grants to cover 58 rural Ohio counties. The Portsmouth City Health Department and contractual agencies, with the Mansfield/Ontario/Richland County Health Department; Allen County Health Department; Zanesville-Muskingum County Health Department provided disease intervention services and partner notification services to the 58 rural region 8 counties of Ohio.

The DIS is responsible for following up on any HIV and Syphilis reportable cases. The Disease Intervention Specialist (DIS) will ascertain and perform a follow-up on the contacts of individuals who have tested positive for HIV and/or Syphilis.

#### Part C/Ryan White Primary Care – Linda Nichols

The Part C/Ryan White Early Intervention Services grant for 2013 was \$249,219 which is 100% direct federally funded. The Part C EIS grant covers seven counties in Kentucky; three counties in West Virginia; and fourteen counties of southeastern Ohio. Portsmouth City Health Department (PCHD) provides primary care services to those enrolled in the Part C/Ryan White EIS program. PCHD has a full time Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) providing care and treatment to clients in our PCHD Primary Care Clinic, along with physician services from Southern Ohio Medical Center two days per month. There were four satellite contracts serving the coverage areas in 2013. The four satellite providers in 2013 were: Adena/Pike Medical & Surgical Associates, Ellis Frazier, M.D., located in Pike County, Ohio; University Physicians, Thomas Rushton, M.D., located in Marshall University, Huntington, West Virginia; Andrew Murry, M.D., located in Lancaster, Ohio with office in Athens, Ohio; Cecilia Gaynor, M.D., located in Ashland, Kentucky.

## Injury Prevention - Lisa Roberts RN; Dr. Randy Schlegel LICDC-CS, DC; Rebecca Miller M.S. Ed.

Injury Prevention at the Portsmouth City Health Department administered a total of three Projects in FY2013

These Projects included:

- "A Prescription for Community Recovery"-a Pilot Project funded at \$48,500 by the Ohio Department of Health to address adult fatal prescription drug overdose.
- "Project DAWN-Deaths Avoided With Naloxone"- a Pilot Project funded at \$40,000 by the Ohio Department of Health to address adult fatal prescription drug overdose through the use of nasal naloxone in a community setting.
- "Drug Free Communities Support Program" funded by the Office of National Drug Control Policy at \$125,000 to address youth substance use.

These projects complement each other, and all serve to reduce community rates of substance use, abuse, and fatal overdose-as well as those negative health factors that are associated with substance abuse. These Projects utilize a population-based approach to addressing the drug problem in Scioto County through education, enforcement, environmental changes, and cross-systems collaboration. As a

result of our efforts, 1.5M *less* pain pills were dispensed in Scioto County in 2011 as compared to 2010. This reflected a 17% reduction-and the direct overdose death rate also declined 17%. Innovative community engagement strategies resulted in long-term changes in perception of harm and attitudes regarding prescription pain pills, as well as statewide policy changes regarding opioid prescribing. These Projects collaborate with state-level coalitions and Task Forces led by the Ohio Department of Health (Prescription Drug Abuse Action Group) and the Governors Opiate Cabinet Action Team. Efforts in 2013 focused on expanding access to naloxone and education of prescribers on best practices regarding the use of controlled substances. More substance abuse treatment was made available in Scioto County due to collaboration and state government assistance. Scioto County remains a "Pilot County" for targeted interventions- and its programs are being replicated throughout Ohio, as well as in other states.

#### **Successes of the Scioto County Drug Action Team in 2013:**

- Maintained a community coalition whose focus is on reducing substance use and abuse. Ten coalition meetings were conducted in 2013.
- Established Drug Free Youth-led Prevention Groups in 10 local High Schools.
- Conducted data collection through Scioto County's first large-scale survey of youth substance use, knowledge, protective factors, and risk factors.
- Created a data-driven Strategic Action Plan for the coalition that included short-term and long-term measurable goals.
- Conducted Challenge Days at two local High Schools serving 239 youth.
- Presented at six national conferences regarding strategies to reduce substance use and abuse (Ohio, Kentucky, Florida, Michigan, S. Carolina, and Puerto Rico).
- Collaborated with the Ohio Attorney General and CADCA on two video productions regarding the opioid epidemic.
- Piloted Ohio's first Community-Based Naloxone Program (Project DAWN) which is now replicated in eight counties. Provided technical assistance and training to new counties who have established naloxone programs. Assisted the state legislature with education regarding naloxone distribution programs in preparation for HB170 which passed as an Emergency Bill in March 2014. HB170 expanded access to naloxone statewide through the establishment of Good Samaritan Laws, wider prescribing, and barrier reduction.
- Project DAWN has served 129 clients so far-and 23 lives have been saved through the administration of Naloxone by lay-savers.
- Two staff members attended the CADCA (Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America) Academy and graduated from the National Coalition Institute.
- Collaborated with numerous agencies on the annual Scioto Rally for Recovery which raised \$7,000.00 for substance abuse prevention.
- Collaborated with local, state, and federal agencies on a multitude of projects that serve to attack the prescription drug epidemic of fatal overdoses that is taking place across the nation.

As the Solicitor for the City of Portsmouth, Mr. Haas prosecutes a wide range of misdemeanor criminal cases. He is also chief legal counsel for Portsmouth City Council and attends all City Council meetings.

Mr. Haas was a member of Portsmouth City Council from December 2008 through his resignation as President of Council in December 2012. Mr. Haas has been engaged in the private practice of law in Portsmouth since October 1993. He was a partner in the Ruggiero & Haas, Co. law firm from January 1999 through September 2012.

He is admitted to practice before all state and local courts in the State of Ohio. ### POLICE DEPARTMENT



The Portsmouth Police Department has continued to have a positive impact on the community, despite staffing shortfalls. The shortfall is expected to continue due to the lack of qualified applicants and officer attrition. Despite a lack of employees, the department continues to maintain a School Resource Officer (SRO) and participates in a High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) task force in cooperation with the FBI and the Scioto County Sheriff's Office.

With the transition in police vehicles from the Crown Victoria to the Police Interceptor, the department is transitioning into Black vehicles with white decaling. In addition, while subtle, officers are transitioning into a newer style of uniform that allows for increased comfort and functionality.

Officers responded to 22,685 calls for service in 2013, a 12% increase over 2012. 1,096 arrests have been made for the year through October 31. That number already exceeds that of 2013 and already represents a 15% increase over 2012. Of those 1096 arrests, 55 have been juvenile arrests.

Traffic crashes continue to be too high. Officers responded to 1078 crashes in 2012 and 1084 crashes in 2013. If current numbers hold true, that number is expected to increase in 2014. Speed and distracted driving continue to be contributing factors in crashes. Seatbelt usage remains significantly lower than the state average. Officers will continue to work with our state partners to target crash causing behaviors.

Portsmouth experienced a decrease in violent crime reported in 2013 of 16% since 2011 and 25% since 2009. This decrease is attributed to a reduction of robberies from 52% in 2011 and 58% from 2009. Property crime reported in 2013 while still extremely high has also decreased. Total property crime fell by 24% since 2011 and 33% since 2010. This decrease is attributed to a 40% reduction in burglaries and breaking and entering since 2011 (42% since 2010) and a 37% reduction in motor vehicle thefts since 2012. Through the first six months of 2014, the decrease in property crimes reported continues. \*



#### William "Bill" Beaumont – Service Department Director

Mr. Beaumont is a lifelong resident of Portsmouth and the surrounding area. He is a Vietnam War Era veteran, and has been the Director of the Service Department since 2010. His past work experience includes 8 years as a Construction Inspector at Portsmouth's Gaseous Centrifuge Enrichment Plant in Piketon, OH, 17 years as a Field Observer for Tanner Stone & Company Architects and 3 years as the Assistant Director of Engineering for the City of Portsmouth.

The Portsmouth City Department of Public Service is comprised of 5 Divisions: Sanitation – Street Maintenance – Traffic – Grounds Maintenance – Fleet Maintenance. This department oversees a combined operational budget in excess of 2.0 million dollars and employs 32 full-time personnel that are managed by the Public Service Director.

The Department of Public Service touches the daily lives of city residents in many ways. Whenever you travel any of the 110 miles of roads and bridges, play at or visit one of the 12 parks, walk through or around our beautiful cemetery, swim at the McKinley pool, dispose of household waste or bury a loved one, you are using just a few of the services that the city provides.

Employees mow over 165 acres of city parks, recreational facilities, and road sides every two weeks, and weed abate over 50 lots and empty houses. Employees will service and maintain over 50 traffic signals, over 5,000 street and traffic signs, and will paint/stripe over 80 miles of streets.

Every year the employees of the Public Service Department will respond to over 1,000 citizens calls, remove over 10,000 tons of solid waste from residents homes, sweep over 200 miles of street curbs and highway edges, utilize over 500 tons of material to patch pot holes, patch water line breaks, make road repairs, remove 1,000 cubic yards of leaves each fall, and spread around an average of 900 tons of salt during the winter.

These are just the highlights of what this department accomplishes year to year. There are many other things such as seasonal decorating, street blocking for parades and special events, removing dead animals from public streets/highways, tree planting, maintenance, and removal, which is done throughout the work schedule. 




#### Richard Duncan – Sewage Treatment Department Director

Richard Duncan, P.E., is the Director of Wastewater and Flood Defense. There are 25 employees in the department, which is responsible for maintaining the sewage collection system for the City of Portsmouth, as well as the treatment of sewage to meet the standards of the Environmental Protection Agency. He is also responsible for the City's Flood Defense System which protects the city from flooding of the Ohio River. The Flood Defense System includes the levee, floodwall, and several large pumping stations.

Mr. Duncan was Portsmouth's Public Utilities Director from 1986 to 1997, when he left to work in construction engineering. Mr. Duncan has worked on major water and wastewater projects in Detroit, Toledo, Cincinnati and elsewhere. In 2005, he returned to work for the City in his current position.

He is a graduate of Portsmouth High School and the University of Cincinnati where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering. He is a registered professional engineer in the State of Ohio. He has also been certified as a Class IV Wastewater Operator and a Class III water treatment operator by the Ohio EPA.

Mr. Duncan is a lifelong resident of Scioto County and a member of Christ's Community Church. He represents the City as a member of the Association of Ohio Metropolitan Wastewater Authorities (AOMWA), the Ohio River Valley Sanitation Committee (ORSANCO), and the Ohio Water Environment Federation.

There are 7 Flood Defense Pump Stations in the City of Portsmouth. The largest is Station No. 5 which has 3 large pumps. During heavy storms these pumps pump water over the levee to keep from flooding the city. The pumps must be manned while in operation. The pumps at this station each pump water out of the city at a rate of 24,700 gallon per minute per pump.





If there is a threat of flood the first flood gate will be installed when the river water reaches 50ft.

On February 24, 2014, Portsmouth City Council authorized the appropriation for the construction of two levee relief wells in order for the City's flood defense system to be certifid according to the standards set by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). In September, Reiser Construction a local contractor was hired to prepare the site for the relief wells and in October the construction of the wells began. The relief wells will each be 61ft deep and will relieve the pressure on the levee if the river elevation is at a very high level. The well contractor was Moody's of Dayton.

# PUBLIC UTILITIES WATER FILTRATION PLANT



The Filtration Plant is located just east of New Boston. Water is drawn from the Ohio River and then is treated to make it safe for human consumption. From the treatment plant water is pumped both east and west to our customers. The City has storage tanks and booster stations all over the area and the tanks are listed as follows: Serving areas west of the plant is a 350,000 gallon tank in West Portsmouth, 22,000,000 gallons in the Sunrise Avenue Reservoir,1,000,000 gallon Sunrise High Tank which services the higher elevations of the City such as the Hospital, the Upper end of Mabert Road and North Hill Road, 350,000 gallons on Dehner Street in Rosemount, 100,000 gallons in Eden Park and 500,000 gallons at Cook Road that supplies the Southern Ohio Correctional Facility. Areas east of the plant are served via the 1,600,000 gallons in Basham Reservoir which is on the top of the hill across from Wal-Mart, 750,000 gallon tank in Franklin Furnace (green & white) 50,000 gallons at Woodland Heights, 800,000 gallons on top of Sugar Camp Road with feeds the upper elevations of Wheelersburg and 185,000 gallons on Canterbury Road.

# PUBLIC UTILITIES WATER FILTRATION DEPARTMENT



#### Sam Sutherland – Water Department Director

Sam Sutherland is the Director of Public Utilities-Water. He has been employed with the City since 1989 and is a graduate of Hocking College. He is a Class IV Water Supply Operator and is also certified in bacteriological and chemical testing of drinking water by Ohio EPA.

The water department has 38 employees and is responsible for the treatment and distribution of potable water to approximately 40,000 customers not only in the City of Portsmouth but also portions of Scioto County including West Portsmouth, Wheelersburg and Rosemount.

The Water Treatment Plant uses water from the Ohio River as its source. The plant is currently rated for 12 million gallons per day and is operating at approximately 5.5 million gallons per day.

The distribution system extends 25 miles to the east, 18 miles to the west and 10 miles to the north from the plant. The department is responsible for the operation and maintenance of all piping, valves, water meters, 900 fire hydrants as well as 11 booster stations, 9 water tanks and 2 finished water reservoirs.

Mr. Sutherland occasionally takes area schools on tours of the plant. If someone wants a tour of the plant, they need to call ahead of time and be put on the schedule.
